Principal's Note

Kia Ora St Theresa's whanau,

The excitement and buzz is definitely building for our Carnival on Saturday and the weather even looks like it will play its part. Please let us know if you haven't signed up for a role on the day as we have several areas that could do with extra support.

The childen's Lego Structure Competition is creating much excitement around the school and it has been great hearing about the structures that are currently being built by the children. The Lego will be judged in 3 groups, Kakano (Rooms 1, 2 and 3), Pihinga (Rooms 6,7 and 8) and Pohutukawa (Rooms 9 and 10). Judging will be in the form of whomever's structure receives the most money and we will have prizes for 1st, 2nd and 3rd. The children have been asked to deliver their entries to Rm 4 on Friday with a note detailing their name and room number. They are welcome to name their entry as well. The entries will be able to be picked up at the end of the Carnival, however if you need to leave early, they will be kept safe at school until they can be picked up.

Many people have asked about how COVID 19 could affect our Carnival and the potential for having to close the school. The Ministry of Health's current advice is that with continued vigilance, the chance of widespread community outbreak is expected to remain low. So, we all have a role here to minimise the spread of COVID-19. Our school staff and leadership team remain well prepared for the possibility there might be a case in our community. If that were to occur, we are confident we can put our plans in place and know we will be supported by regional health authorities and the Ministry of Education. I am sure you are all keen to do what you can to prevent risk of infection. The best preventative steps are: wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and dry thoroughly;

avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands; avoid sharing anything that has come into contact with saliva, either in your living or social environments; stay home when you are sick and seek medical attention; cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the rubbish; get adequate sleep and eat well-balanced meals to ensure a healthy immune system. As a school, we have been very well supported to date by the Ministries of Health and Education.

Yesterday I met with Josh Clark from Kainga Ora – Homes and Communities and was updated on the new use of the property at 2 Grays Road, Plimmerton. As you may be aware, the Government is attempting to deliver more public housing and this includes transitional housing. The property currently called Spinnaker Motel, has been purchased and will be developed into transitional housing to provide a safe place for people to live until they find a more permanent address. Emerge Aotearoa will be responsible for the people and families living there and will be supported by the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development. Residents are
